

Strawberry Hill Players Present Neil Simon's "Rumors"

The Strawberry Hill Players' production of Rumors proved to be an incredibly enjoyable evening full of laughs, chaos, and well...nimors! This play, written by Neil Simon and wonderfully directed by Jim Ringel, was the group's first comedy in three years. Nonstop laughter filled the large auditorium at Stamford High School on their closing night, November 12, 2011. The audience's interest was grabbed in the very first scene, as a couple, to be the first guests at a wedding anniversary celebration, is bickering over some questioning by a doctor on the phone about the host, Charlie, who throughout the play existed only behind a closed door - a door that looked scarily realistic, as did the rest of the two-story home the entire play took place in. And it amazed me that with one set constructed behind these actors, an entire play was performed with such movement and alacrity. In this "farce" (type of play where characters move on and off stage with one background), the audience never grew tired of the panoramic living-room set-up.

The first Act could have stood on its own, for it satisfied both the humor and mystery aspects that could capture any audience. Ken and Chris Gorman, played by Bennett Leeds and Kimmy Loop, found their friend Charlie shot in the ear and his wife Mira, missing as they came to attend their beloved friends' 10th wedding anniversary party. Claire and Lenny Ganz, played by Jennifer.

Sapozhnikov and Sam Strizver, enter the scene as the other couple is



trying to hide the fact of their discoveries, and so badly failing to do so. Leeds was the perfect man to have to try to keep a secret. He was very entertaining to watch. Strizver and Sapozhnikov were hilariously dramatic in their acting. When they heard the news of Charlie they broke down in tears and belted out the most ridiculously finny things.

The couple Emie and Cookie Cusak is played by Chet King and Ruby Welkovich. King uttered his first lines in a British accent, however, throughout the play, it was slightly difficult to detect where specifically his character was from, for the accent ranged from British to a hint of Jamaican mixed with Irish, and a few instances of Australian. Whatever accent he spoke, it never ceased to entertain the audience. As more couples enter the scene, each one quickly learns of the supposed attempt of suicide of their friend Charlie. They spend the entirety of the play figuring out what to do and

how to make sure word does not get out. Cassie and Glen Cooper are played by Erin Altieri and Matthew Sweeny. Altieri does a fine job in portraying a southern accent. It was a kind of dramatic irony to watch the two bicker about the smallest of things such as Cassie dropping her jewelry down the toilet, when there was a possible suicide in the room just upstairs. Fingers are burned in the kitchen, Chris gets buzzed, Glen is domestically violated by his angry wife, Ken accidentally deafened his ear with a gunshot, and Cookie is on the floor due to a painful back-ache.

The many catastrophes occurring with each character are all happening in one scene and it was very amusingly chaotic. The director did a great job of keeping the chaos in the background alive while having each character stand out at different point in the play. Loop played a very convincing drunk!

The second act is absolute mayhem. As the actors dance to "Para Bailar La Bamba," in a very artistic, creative, and unique way. This was probably one of the most entertaining scenes. The dancing skills in the drama club are very high on the scale and I don't think I've seen anything like it! There was a mix of dancing-styles, including the shuffle, a bit of the robot, and I swear I even saw some Michael Jackson moves being pulled off. Officers Pudney and Welch, played by Winston Sinclair and Alexandra Brokowski, arrive at the scene questioning the party guests. The most entertaining and climactic scene is when Lenny Ganz mustered up an entire story to the cops as he pretends to be Charlie. Strizver's dramatic hand gestures and perfectly spoken Spanish is without a doubt the most entertaining part of the play - and that's really saying something, considering that the entire production was hilarious!

From start to finish, this play was a success. A tragic incident was covered with great comic sensibility that almost any type of audience would find enjoyable - it was sarcastic, silly, chaotic, and just plain amusing. The cast of ten put on a production worthy of five stars! I am very much looking forward to the Strawberry Hill Player's upcoming shows: S.H.I.P, Senior Scenes XIII, and Bye Bye Birdie. 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
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
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Stamford High Gets Hypnotized





The word Portmenteau is a blend of two (or more) words or into one new word.






Security Guard James Jordan Keeps Our Halls Safe






Wasted Equipment at Stamford High



I am an eclectic listener, meaning that I listen to many types of music, from classics like Beethoven's 5th Symphony, to the punk rock best of Four Year Strong, to the rapcore beats of Chronic Future and Borialis, to the classic rock of AC/DC, Rush and Queen, to the smooth jazz licks of Chuck Mangione and Dake Ellington, the occasional modern genre including Daughtry and Black Eyed Peas, and even some pounding metalcore of Avenged Sevenfold.

The issues seemed to start in the midil 990's, when MP3 files got their start. It became easier to compress and separate recordings, and therefore a sort of war broke out. Known as the "Compression Wars," recording companies strived to crunch in as many music files onto one file or recorder as

possible. This began to turn into a quantity vs. quality fight, with many bands pumping out music at breakneck paces. This led to a lack in quality of many "albums," more rightfully called a compilation of tracks. A true album doesn't need a skip button, and the music throughout possesses more quality tunes than a present-day album. This allowed listeners to truly absorb the true musicality of whichever artist is playing the music.

Recent figures indicate that over 80% of adolescents aged 13-19 have an iPod or personal music player, whether it is a Zune on another MP3 player. With these players come ear buds, and they deliver crisp sound, but the file compression that music companies do to get those recordings to you eliminates key elements of what a musical piece really is. If you take a virryl record of, say, a Beatles. album, and an MP3 version of the same album, you will be able to truly hear how file compression is making music suffer. This compression spurs bands and singers such as Justin Beiber to not only make masse on the spot, but to record it so it is simple to compress and share. If you enjoy the lilip-hop on pop rock of today, consider some of these artists, who have similar styles but aren't as prominent.

If you like Justin Beiber's bullad-ish lyrios, then try

My message instead is to have you rethink what you are listening to, and maybe capand your musical honzons to explore and enjoy artists new and old. I hope I have sent a message to readers out there, and that maybe we won't be so culturally in the dark.

Boys' Hockey Jamboree


