

What About A Career In Writing

Not everyone writes Agatha Christie novels or does exposes major government coverups, but if you enjoy working with words writing can be a rewarding career for you.

Writers, first of all, should know everything about everything. That's possible, of course, so besides a certain knack for putting sentences together well and a good liberal arts education, a writer needs to know how to dig up facts wherever they may be.

The field of writing offers a tremendous number of career Magazines, possibilities. newspapers, advertising agenhouses, publishing cies, schools, large industries, small businesses, tourist companies, dozens of other institutions need writers. Your work environment may range from a 100-year old cluttered newsroom city on metropolitan daily newspaper to a slick modern one-man suite on Madison Avenue. The salary range for writers is just We've all heard as wide. stories of the starving writer in the attic down the street as well as the Truman Capotes who fly to Zurich just for breakfast. A good writer has no limitations.

Although some well-known writers have made their fortune with little formal education, it's a good idea to get as much education as possible before you take up the pen for good. Editors and others who hire new writers agree that the best education a writer can have is a general education.

A liberal arts degree with strong emphasis on English and various writing skills fits this bill just right. Taking this into consideration, it's not surprising that English majors from a liberal arts program make some of the best writers. And since "writing" these days usually means "typewriting" it's extremely important that

you have a good mastery of the Smith Corona.


What can you do now to help prepare yourself for a writing career? The answer is so important we've set aside a special paragraph for it.

Write.

That's correct. Artists learn to paint by painting and writers learn to write by writing. Along with your high school and college grammar, syntax, word choice, and vocabulary practice you need to write as much as possible. Try writing for your school magazine, or eyen <u>fo</u>r vour town's newspaper. To make a success of writing you need eventually a long list of places which have published your work. You can start that list now by getting your writing into print, no matter how lowly the publication seems

And a word of admonition! Writing is not easy to enter as a career. There are insensitive editors out there and people who can, believe it or not, live without your poetry. There are also snares such as split infinitives, deadwood, dangling participles, and (perish the thought!) cliches. They all represent potential pits which may entrap the newborn writer in you. They also represent challenges the kind of challenges writers can meet with just a twist of the hand!
